PUSHING FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS AMID A PANDEMIC

Note: The story below highlights how Scecina implemented a hybrid system of in-person and online classes as school started again in August. In November Archdiocese of Indianapolis schools in Marion County, including Scecina, returned to online only learning at the recommendation of the county public health department.

Scecina continues to make the safety and academic success of its students and its teachers a top priority during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Scecina is using all the professional educational tools and processes available to make the school year positive and successful, while remaining rooted in faith, said Interim Principal **David Dellacca**.

“More than anything, this is our faith in action,” he said. “This is a time we rely on God in ways we didn’t know we needed him before. If nothing else, it’s given people time and opportunity to realize where their strength comes from.”

BACK TO SCHOOL

After a long break that started unexpectedly in March 2020, Scecina reopened its doors to students on August 10, 2020. Students are divided among four cohorts and attend classes in person or online every day on a “hybrid” schedule of Red and Gold Days. At the end of the first grading period, 41 percent of Scecina’s students had made the honor roll.

Scecina’s keys to success are:

- Ongoing professional development for teachers.

- Synchronous learning.
- A switch to block scheduling.
- Hiring of an online learning advisor.

ONGOING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The school already had been working with consultants from Tools for Success, a Central Indiana company that focuses on “the art of learning with the tool of teaching.”

“The academic departments have been meeting in small groups and working really well together to develop department-wide strategies,” he said. “Their meetings with Tools for Success are in small groups with teachers from other departments. It’s really good to have that dedicated time and hear from outside experts on best practices for teaching.”

Marty Moore, a Tools for Success education coach, works with Scecina teachers. She has had an “incredible experience of working alongside Scecina staff this past year.”

“Their ‘can-do’ attitude as they’ve moved from face-to-face to virtual to hybrid exemplifies the mission of Scecina to motivate lifelong learners. Every day in the building I see them pouring into students and walking the way of servant leadership,” she said.

SYNCHRONOUS LEARNING

Scecina was able to use technology to accommodate the hybrid schedule in the classroom. Teachers can teach to the students physically in the classroom while also teaching the students who are learning at home.

BLOCK SCHEDULING

For 2020-21, Scecina implemented a block schedule of longer class periods. The decision came after much study and discussion among teachers and administrators and support shown by parents during summer input sessions.

Block scheduling benefits include a slower pace for teachers and students while allowing them to get to know one another better; more in-depth learning; absent students miss only four classes in one day; and stress levels often decrease.

“We already were studying block scheduling and probably would have made the switch,” said Scecina President **Joe Therber**. “The pandemic just moved the process along more quickly.”

Students continue to have eight academic classes, but no longer all in one day. They now have four 80-minute classes per day.

“Classes really benefit from having a longer time with students, in a lot of the arts, and in science, such as more time for labs and experiments, and in our media production class, for example,” Mr. Dellacca said.

ONLINE LEARNING ADVISOR

Some students are facing significant barriers to success during the pandemic. Some have been in mandatory quarantine or live in a home where members are medically compromised. Others are international students living in China or Brazil.

Scecina’s new online learning advisor, **Ben Potts**, helps by:

- Monitoring and supporting online students’ daily attendance and academic achievement
- Solving problems with students, families, and teachers regarding online students’ academic engagement and progress
- Serving as part of the Student Support Team to ensure that online learners’ perspectives are considered in decision-making
- Assisting in academic, social-emotional, and behavioral interventions for online students.

A PARENT’S PERSPECTIVE

Cheryl Hentz, a parishioner at St. Michael Catholic Church in Greenfield, has two sons at Scecina: Anthony, a senior, and Matthew, a freshman.

“Mentally, emotionally, spiritually, the kids needed to be here. The spring (with the sudden closure) was hard,” she said.

She has been impressed with how Scecina has adapted with the block schedules and proper safety procedures. Her sons are having a good year, better than her friends’ children in other schools, she said.

“I think Scecina took a real measured approach to starting the school year, and I think that was what helped, and the teachers have been fabulous,” she said. “This was very well planned out. I appreciate that Scecina took its time and didn’t make rash decisions. I think that’s why the fall has gone so well.”

A TEACHER’S PERSPECTIVE

Kathryn Wetzel, chair of Scecina’s English Department, is teaching for her sixth year at Scecina. She teaches all freshman English classes and is moderator of the Book Club and the new Creative Writing Club.

“Trying to give kids in the room and at home the same amount of attention has been a real challenge, as has keeping the students engaged and focused while at home,” she said.

Ms. Wetzel focuses on the “silver linings.” Mastering new technologies, while challenging, has given her extra skills for the future. Trying to give attention to each student helps her make every encounter count and focus on what is most important to teach.

“If you dwell on the negative, that’s all you see; if you choose to search for the silver linings and moments of gratitude, then you have a much better outlook and mental health,” she said. ■

TEACHER AND STUDENT PANDEMIC PERSPECTIVES



"Teaching during this pandemic has certainly been the most unique in my 18 years. While there are many difficulties that can't be ignored, one positive aspect is I have forced myself to be very intentional with every moment I have. Every activity, lecture, assessment, etc. needs to have a specific purpose as our time together, both virtually and physically, is more limited. I try to do that while not losing focus on the most important thing, the students' overall well-being."

STUDENT LEADERS RISE TO CHALLENGES

The 2020-21 school year has thrown many obstacles in front of students trying to experience a traditional school year. Student leaders are at the forefront of trying to figure out how to create a memorable and productive year.

Instead of the usual election by the whole school, students who were running for the Scecina Student Council this year were interviewed by Catholic Theology teacher Ms. **Margaret Zeh Fulford** and Assistant Principal **Jesse Purvis**, who chose the officers. Student Council meetings have been a virtual affair.

“I’ve been online for all of our student council meetings,” said **Emaleigh Hines**, president of the student body. “That’s been weird, not being in there.”

This fall, student leaders organized Homecoming events, a COVID care package drive, and TLC, an annual fundraiser for a Christmas giving tree program for two families in need. StuCo’s annual canned food drive that usually occurs in November before Thanksgiving has been pushed back to the spring.

Homecoming planning went through several stages, said **Anthony Higgins**, vice president of the student body.

“We tried to do what we did last year. Last year we actually had a dance outside,” he said. “But then (this year) we slowly started to scale down things for social distancing reasons.”

“We were able to organize a PowderPuff game. That was fun,” he said.

Seniors chose a theme (Board Games) for the traditional Homecoming hall decorating competition among the four classes, which the seniors won with their inspired version of Candyland.

The TLC fundraising drive was cut a little short, but the shopping for two families goes on – via Amazon, said Emaleigh.

“Not everyone is going to be able to participate. Normally each class would get two families, and we’d actually go out shopping. Last year the juniors went shopping and we have wrapping parties to wrap the gifts.”

“Everyone normally wants to do the TLC stuff, it’s fun to do,” said Emaleigh, who’s been on Student Council for each of her four Scecina years. She has a scholarship to Marian University and plans to become a special education teacher.

Anthony, who was a junior class representative last year, has been applying to colleges, including Purdue, Rose-Hulman and wants to study mechanical engineering.

“I think we all kind of knew from tone of last year. We were doing Student Council meetings online already and I think we knew that’s how it was going to be. Everything now has as much sense of being online as possible to get everyone involved,” he said.

For the spring, they are wondering whether they can have a prom. “That’s the one major thing that we’re looking at, probably finding an alternative to prom,” said Anthony. ■

Student Ambassadors help Scecina staff with events, especially for enrollment recruitment, including New Student Orientation, Open House, visits to grade schools, and shadow days, as well as graduation and Baccalaureate. While serving these duties, they also gain experience in public speaking, organization, customer service, and event preparation.

Layden honed his public-speaking skills when he spoke to the prospective students and their families at Scecina's 2020 Open House on Nov. 5.

"I got a great feeling when the families I was speaking with let me know that the message I was giving to them allowed them a little more clarity in their school selection," he said. ■

SENIOR MAKES COTILLION DEBUT

Diamond Williams Hayes is a go-getter and a leader at Scecina and outside of school.

The senior, in her second year at Scecina, was elected as a Student Council class representative this fall. On November 8, she was among 21 young women, all seniors in high school, who were formally presented to the Indianapolis community at the 2020 Debutante Cotillion and Scholarship Program hosted by Ivy Endowment, Inc. in partnership with Alpha Mu Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

The cotillion and scholarship event, which was virtual and pre-recorded this year, capped years of hard work by Diamond and her fellow debutantes. The program focuses on the needs of minority and under-served young women who aspire to attend college and who are supported by African-American female mentors from the

community. Diamond received a scholarship to help pay for books at college.

“I’ve been involved since seventh grade, and I liked it so much,” Diamond said. “I thought it was a positive development experience for African-American young women.” For community service, Diamond chose to serve lunch to the homeless residing at the Wheeler Mission’s Center for Women and Children.

“I paid for food from Subway, for about 80 women,” Diamond explained. “I brought food to them

at Wheeler Mission and served it to them. It was a good experience. I was happy to give that little extra, and I want to do it again.”

Diamond is considering a career in nursing or physical therapy. She’s a hard worker who already has most of her school credits. Her college choices are Marian University at Indianapolis, Earlham College in Richmond, Ind., or Spelman College in Atlanta, the oldest historically black college for women in America.

After two periods of school, she’s able to leave school in the afternoons for an unpaid internship with SeniorIXCare in Carmel, Ind. She’s a home health care aide for an 80-year-old woman.

Besides Student Council, at Scecina Diamond also is a member of National Honor Society and considers herself a mentor to younger girls at school.

“I will give back to Scecina when I’m able to,” said Diamond. “It’s been a blessing to me, and I’m thankful.” ■

SCECINA FRESHMAN ATTENDS VIRTUAL MEETING WITH U.S. SUPREME COURT JUSTICE

Tyaira Jointer joined six other Indianapolis students in a Sept. 23 session with **Justice Sonia Sotomayor** as part of the Reading and Robes program, a project by the National Judicial College. Tyaira was invited by Marion County Superior Court **Judge David Dreyer**, who held the local session in his courtroom in the City-County Building.

Tyaira received a signed copy of one of Justice Sotomayor's bestselling books, "The Beloved World of Sonia Sotomayor," and finished reading the book over one weekend. Sotomayor is the first Latino and Puerto Rican on the U.S. Supreme Court.

"She had all the odds stacked against her, but she really made something of her life," Tyaira said. Tyaira said she would give the book five out of five stars.

After meeting Sotomayor, Tyaira said, "She seems really personable. That's what impressed me the most."

After the question-and-answer session with Sotomayor, the students also heard from Judge Dreyer about how he became interested in the law and what cases he has heard as a Marion County judge.

Tyaira wants to be either a doctor or a lawyer. The law was something she was able to learn more about during the session with a Supreme Court justice and local judge.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM KEEPS CALM AND CARRIES ON DURING PANDEMIC

Scecina's International Program continues to flourish, on a different level, during the pandemic. The COVID-19 pandemic certainly put a cloud over Scecina and its partner international education organizations, said **John Hegarty**, Director of International Programs at Scecina.

Last school year, Scecina was hosting 19 international students. Then came March, when Scecina had to suspend in-person classes. Like dominos, the international groups, one by one, started asking students to return to their homes.

"We, the host parents and the natural parents together decided the best course of action for each student. It was a hectic year, but we learned a lot," Mr. Hegarty said. "We made sure the kids got home as safely as possible."

Hosts from the Scecina Community drove to Chicago so students would have nonstop flights. Families who had hosted students from the past opened their doors to former international students who needed a home after the American universities they were attending closed doors.

"That just shows the kind of families we have here at Scecina," said Mr. Hegarty.

Eight international students from Brazil, Vietnam, and China were able to finish their studies and graduate from Scecina in 2020. Currently, in the middle of the pandemic, Scecina hosts 10 international students. While some attended in person, others were learning online from their home countries or while staying with hosts or relatives elsewhere in the United States. This year's international program boasts students from Nigeria, Jordan, Italy, Brazil, and China.

For the previous three years, Scecina hosted a group of students from Spain for about three weeks. Such short-term programs have been suspended. A student from France had to cut his stay short this year.

An Italian student, **Tomasso Iach**, arrived this fall.

"Tomasso came through Educatius, one of our main partner organizations," said Mr. Hegarty. "He wanted to come here for his senior year so he can go to an American university. He is interested in Purdue, as are a lot of kids from around the world. We made sure he was a real strong student and that his English was good so he could get right down to work."

International students sometimes are required to take Scecina's

English as a New Language course. To avoid overload for the staff this year, Scecina made sure any international students were well prepared to start classes.

Mr. Hegarty hopes to return to business as usual soon and begin recruiting international students as strongly as before.

"We're optimistic about next year. There are many opportunities," he said. ■

YEARBOOK GOES ALL-DIGITAL

Scecina produced its first digital yearbook during the 2019-2020 year. The decision to move away from a printed yearbook to an online version was made carefully over time because of the cost to the school and students for producing a print version.

Students may still choose to print the yearbook after accessing it online. The yearbook is also stored on the school website rather than on a third-party company's server, which will help make it more permanent.

The new digital platform also allows the yearbook staff to embed videos from YouTube and insert photo slideshows directly into the yearbook pages. ■

For the first time in Scecina history, the Crusaders girls soccer team has won the Indiana Crossroads Conference championship. The girls grabbed the title on Oct. 1 with a 6-3 win over Beech Grove.

Both Head Coach **Kurt Guldner** and Assistant Coach **Matt Black** were leading the Crusaders for their first year.

Guldner, who chairs Scecina's physical education and health department, has coached the Marian University Knights women's soccer team, as well as its baseball team. Coming back to coach high school at Scecina, he said, has been rewarding and "special."

The 2020 football season, the 67th in Scecina's school's history, will "certainly go down as the most bizarre and difficult to navigate," said Coach Hurrle.

"COVID 19 caused us to eliminate practices and change how often we could meet as a team," he said. "We lost two games (forfeits), thus two weeks of practice, in the middle of the season, and the thought of what might be around the corner was never far from our minds."

Hurrle praised the leadership of the eight seniors: **Jackson Pruitt**, **Jack Eichholtz**, **Jameson Welborn**, **Thomas DeFreese**, **Greg Miles**, **Myles Dais**, **Jack Longshore**, and **Anthony Hentz**.

"They did an outstanding job of holding the team together and set positive examples for the younger players to build upon," he said.

If one looks simply at the team's 4-5 record, it would seem to be a disappointing year and, based solely on the record, it also was for the team's goals.

"However, let's look at what the senior class accomplished during their four years of representing Scecina and those players who came before them," said Hurrle. "The seniors were part of 23 varsity wins and were undefeated when playing their JV years."

The Crusaders allowed the fewest points in a season in the last 40 years. The defense had a game average of 10.6, giving up only 95 points all season. The defense played so well that the Crusaders lost only one game by more than a touchdown.

DeFreese moved to second in the record book for interceptions in a game and seventh in career interceptions. Sophomore **Mason Beriault** set another school record when he returned an interception for a 95-yard touchdown.

The Indiana Football Coaches Association named DeFreese (defensive back) and Pruitt (defensive lineman) to its 2A All-State team and named **Ben Dugan** as the 2A Assistant Coach of the Year.

"The team of 2020 will be remembered as one that overcame events beyond their control and represented Scecina



and Scecina Football in a manner that in the future we can and will be very proud of,” said Coach Hurrle.

Led by 14 seniors, the team was ranked in the top 10 in the state throughout the season. During the season, they scored two goals against the eventual state champions, Our Lady of Providence, in a loss early in the season.

Against the background of COVID-19 and a new coaching staff, the team did very well and won the Huskey Classic for the fourth time in a row. Special thanks to coach **Sean Bosley '93**, who came back to his alma mater to share his extensive coaching experience.

Because of this year's adversity, Hegarty said, “This unprecedented year, I believe, was the most successful.”

The team played all scheduled games and won more than half, fielded a JV team throughout the season, and, more importantly, not one player or coach caught the virus.

“I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Scecina administration and the Athletic Department of **Mr. Kehrer** and **Mr. Dugan** for putting in place procedures that kept us all safe,” said Hegarty. “We look forward to next season, hopefully one without

masks, daily check-ins and 6-foot limits. Thanks to all the families and especially the players who played the game they love, while keeping themselves and those around them safe.”

- **New goal:** As a result of the matching gift, Scecina has **set a campaign stretch goal of \$6.6 million** in commitments by Dec. 31, 2020. Meeting the matching gift incentive and going beyond it will help ensure funding for the notable price increases in the construction industry while seeking to fulfill the campaign's original vision. This includes improving and maintaining

the Crusaders baseball field on campus and providing more need-based tuition assistance.

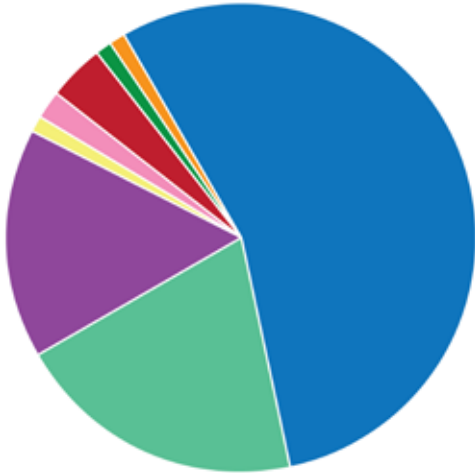

2019-20 REVIEW OF OPERATING REVENUE AND EXPENSES

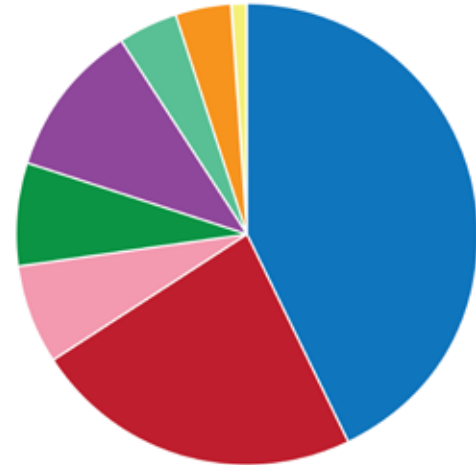

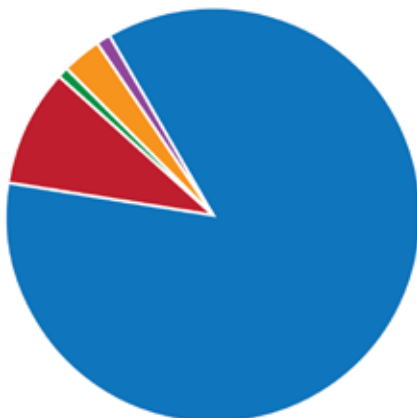

With the blessing of technology, such as Zoom, Seccina instead is visiting virtually all year long with alumni around the country!

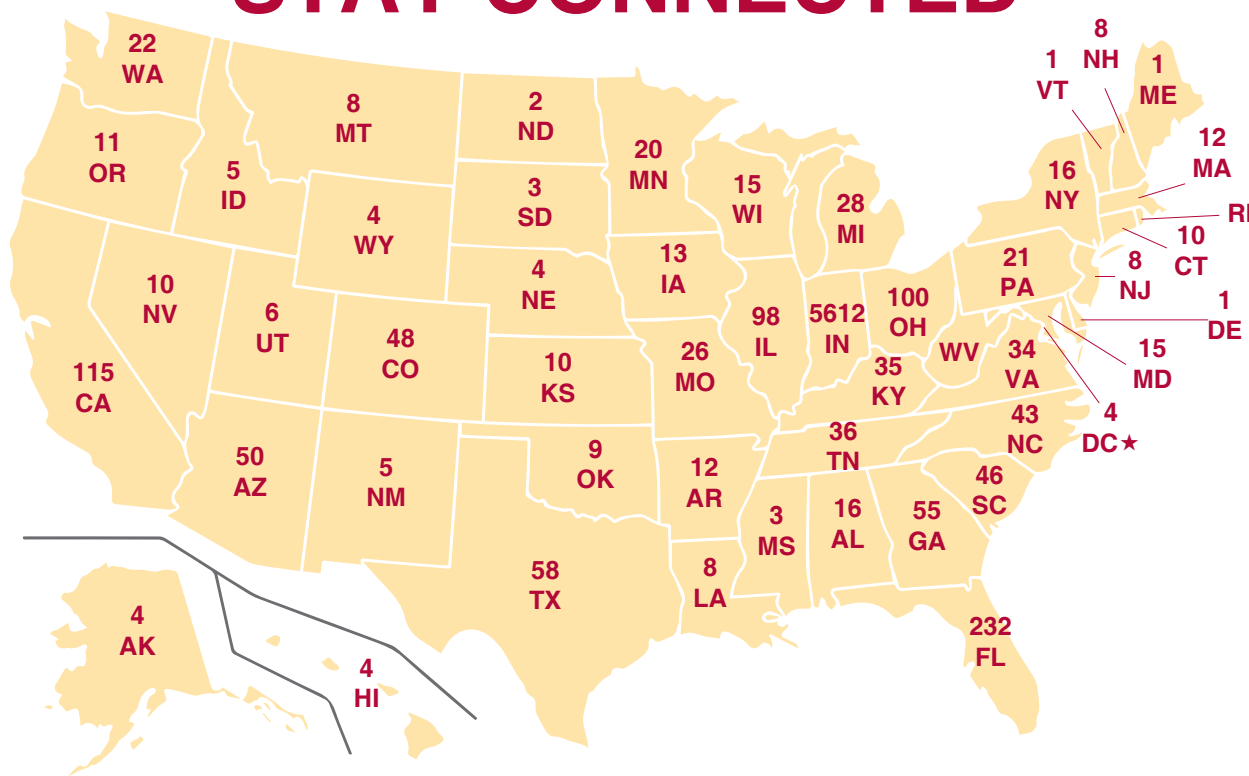

YOUNG SCECINA ALUM PUBLISHES “THE LOST CHILD” ON AMAZON

Just 21 years old and a senior at Hanover College, Scecina alumnus **Andrew Clegg** is now a published author.

The 2017 Scecina graduate started writing “The Lost Child (A Tale of Night and Day)” during his second semester of his sophomore year at Hanover, where he is double majoring in secondary education and health and movement studies. “The Lost Child” started selling on Amazon on June 15, 2020.

“When I was younger, I liked writing stories,” Andrew said. “In fifth grade, I wrote a 30-page story based on a computer game. In sixth grade, my English teacher at Little Flower (Catholic School) was into reading and writing. We wrote short

stories all year long. At some point, I told my mom I wanted to write a book, but I didn’t have an idea. I have always enjoyed writing.”

“The Lost Child” is a young adult fantasy set in a magical world in the vein of “Harry Potter.” The main character is Oliver Hawthorne, the last name an homage to the Little Flower neighborhood street where Clegg grew up.

“The way I came up with an idea is really strange because it’s not remotely what I ended up writing,” Andrew explained. “I had an idea for a character pop in my head and I started writing themes. I would slowly get ideas and plot events.

“I wrote 100 pages, deleted 70 and started over. I basically wrote a whole new book,” he said.

The book’s summary reads: “Oliver Hawthorne has lived in hiding for as long as he can remember. That’s because he’s a grudder, an illegal citizen in the capital city of Maldenney. If anyone ever discovers he exists, he’ll be killed. But when a girl with unusual abilities shows up in the city looking for her missing sister, Oliver has no choice but to step out of the shadows and try to help save her. For the first time in his entire life, he finds himself thrown into a world with people and creatures far more extraordinary than he ever knew existed - and an age old fight much greater than himself.”

Andrew plans for the book to be the first of a series and is already at work on the sequel.

He was studying abroad this spring at the University of Wollongong in Australia and was disappointed he was forced to return home because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

He was able to use the time productively to see his book to print. It’s available as a paperback on Amazon and also via Kindle.

Andrew also learned about the world of independent publishing via Amazon.

“Amazon is pretty easy, because it doesn’t cost them any money, so they’re not concerned about whether it sells,” he explained. “They only print the book if it’s ordered.”

Andrew is very happy with the early sales of his book. He plans to market the book through word of mouth, social media, and visits to schools.

Just finishing his own book gave him a sense of accomplishment.

“I think finishing that first draft in about a year and a half might have the best part. Just the feeling of having done it is more exciting and worthwhile than the sales,” he said.

Andrew, who runs cross country at Hanover, plans to become a physical education teacher. If he hits it in big in the publishing world and becomes a working author, “That would be a dream,” he said. ■

DEVELOPMENT PRIORITY SUMMER 2020: COVID

Despite working from home during spring and summer 2020, the development office did not slow down! Their number one priority was seeking gifts to help fund the safety of our students, families, staff, and the greater Scecina community.

First, **THANK YOU** to the many donors who were able to give during the past year. Because of you, we raised \$200,000 in two months for all the updates necessary for a safe reopening of the school building.

Improvements related to COVID-19 – Because of YOU:

- Campus-wide deep cleaning occurred July 26-29. Each building, office, classroom, restroom, workout space, and shared space across campus, including buses, was cleaned and sanitized.
- Touchless hand sanitizer dispensers installed or deployed in each classroom, office, hallway, school entrance, and St. Francis Hall entrance.
- Touchless lavatory faucets installed at each sink throughout the campus.
- Lidded toilet seats installed on each toilet.
- Touchless water bottle dispensers added to existing water fountains.
- Touchless paper towel dispensers installed in all restrooms.
- Bottles of hand sanitizer distributed to each teacher, support staff member, and administrator. Teachers receive sanitizing wipes for students to clean and disinfect desks before and after every class.

SCECINA WOMEN'S CIRCLE GOES VIRTUAL

Like most occasions this year, the Scecina Women's Circle had to go virtual. This giving circle primarily supports student life programs at Scecina.

From March 2020 through winter 2020, the group has been meeting through Zoom to update members and award funds to student life programs.

Since the founding in 2016, SWC has raised over \$60,000 for student life programs at Scecina. Programs that have received funds are: retreats and campus ministry, clubs, the Arts (theatre, music, and visual art), and the guidance counseling program. Last year, the SWC shifted its collective gift, with members' approval, to provide emergency tuition assistance for families experiencing difficulties due to COVID.

Each year, the group also awards an outgoing senior a \$1,000 scholarship to use for college or his or her next path in life. So far, five scholarships have been awarded to young Scecina alumni, establishing a new SWC tradition.

IRA, RMD, AND QCD EXPLAINED

What's up with the IRA, the RMD and the QCD? Let us explain.

IRA: Individual Retirement Account

RMD: Required Minimum Distribution

QCD: Qualified Charitable Distribution

The CARES Act of 2020 waives RMDs during 2020 for IRAs and retirement plans, including beneficiaries with inherited accounts. However, charitable rollovers from your IRA still could be a good way to give this year to a nonprofit, such as Scecina.

You generally must start taking withdrawals from a retirement account when you reach age 70½. Changes signed into law in December 2019 increase the age to 72 when you must

take the RMD. Due to the changes, if your 70th birthday on July 1, 2019, or later, you do not have to take withdrawals until you reach age 72.

To reduce your tax liability on your RMD, you can consider the qualified charitable distribution, or QCD. Generally, a QCD is an otherwise taxable distribution from an IRA owned by an individual who is age 70½ or over that is paid directly from the IRA to a qualified charity, such as Scecina. In addition to the benefits of giving to Scecina, and feeling good about your donation to the school, a QCD excludes the amount donated from your taxable income.

Can a QCD satisfy my required minimum distribution from an IRA?

Yes, your QCD can satisfy all or part

the amount of your RMD from your IRA. For example, if your RMD is \$10,000, and you made a \$5,000 QCD for 2020, you would have had to withdraw another \$5,000 to satisfy your RMD.

Again, you do not need to take an RMD for 2020. You can read more at www.irs.gov/newsroom/coronavirus-related-relief-for-retirement-plans-and-iras-questions-and-answers. Please check with your tax advisor for more details and the CARES Act effect on the RMD.

Scecina recently talked with Bob Stark about the SSTC.

Scecina: When did you start using the SSTC to give your gift to Scecina?

Bob Stark: We started using the credit to fund the **Jockamo Student Scholarship funded by Bob & Laura Stark** around six years ago.

How did you hear about the SSTC?

We were first introduced to the SSTC through (Scecina Director of Development) **Jim McGuinness** as we were setting up the Jockamo scholarship.

How has it helped you?

Before the U.S. Tax Code change in 2017, we were able to receive a deduction on our federal return and a 50% tax credit on our state tax exposure. Now we only use the credit toward our state tax, which is still a very nice deduction at 50%. Some people may still be able to receive the federal credit; however, it does not apply for our situation.

Why do you give to Scecina?

We believe that Scecina plays a vital role in educating and, to some degree, of stabilizing the Eastside area. We also witnessed the great education and network gained by our kids while they attended Scecina.

How easy was it to use the SSTC?

It is very easy I do it myself.

What would you say to someone considering SSTC?

If you're going to give to Scecina, you might as well help yourself as well and take advantage of the tax break that it offers. ■

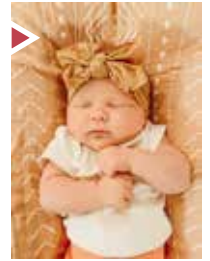

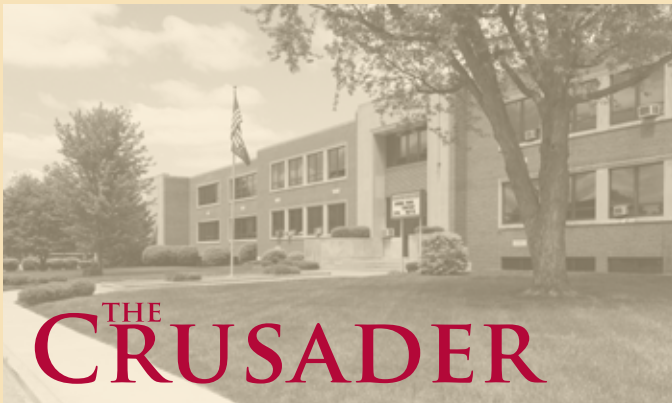

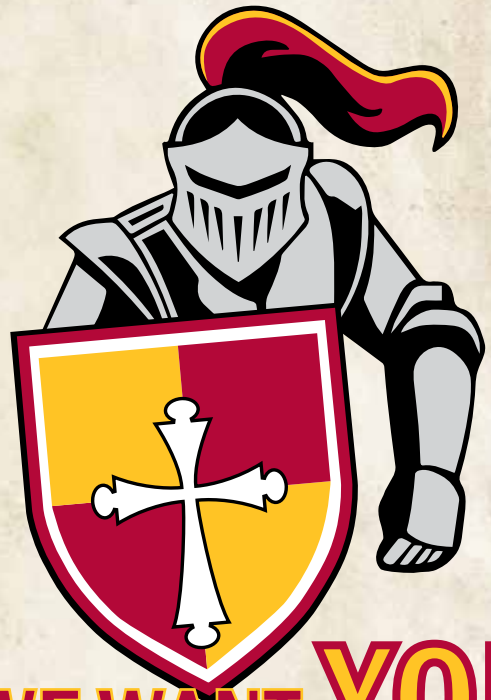
