BRADLEY HILBERS

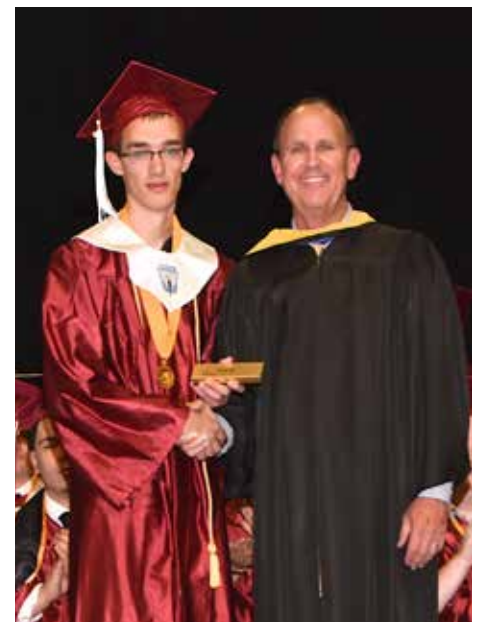

Celebrating the LEADERSHIP & LEGACY of Joe Therber

When **Joe Therber** first joined Scecina in 1986 as a teacher and coach, he began a decades-long journey of service to the school and the wider Archdiocese of Indianapolis that would touch nearly every dimension of Scecina's community and operations. Over the years, he served in roles of increasing responsibility, including teacher, coach, assistant athletic director, director of building and grounds, and athletic director, before returning in 2008 as president following a decade of service in leadership roles for

the Archdiocese of Indianapolis in the Office of Stewardship and Development. Across each chapter of his Scecina career, Therber led with a deep belief in the school's mission and the transformative power of Catholic education.

Inspired by Father Thomas Scecina's example of faith, service, and opportunity, Therber rallied the community to dream bigger, invest boldly, and, in Father Tom's words, "give that little extra". Through his leadership, Scecina strengthened its foundation,

expanded opportunities for students, and positioned itself for a vibrant future.

A VISIONARY

Therber saw not only what Scecina was, but also what it could become.

Throughout his career, he challenged the school community to think beyond immediate needs and embrace a bold vision for the future. He recognized the importance of building a school that was academically vibrant, clear in proclaiming the Catholic faith

- Expand leadership and support structures and systems across the school and the Indianapolis East Deanery.

A CHAMPION FOR STUDENTS

At the center of all of his decisions was a commitment to every one of Scecina's students.

At the heart of Therber's leadership was a belief that all young people deserve the opportunity to discover their gifts, grow in faith, and prepare for a meaningful future. Whether through expanded academic programs, enhanced student support services, faith formation opportunities, or career pathways, his leadership consistently focused on helping students succeed. Because of his commitment, students have received the guidance, resources, and opportunities they need to thrive academically, spiritually, and personally.

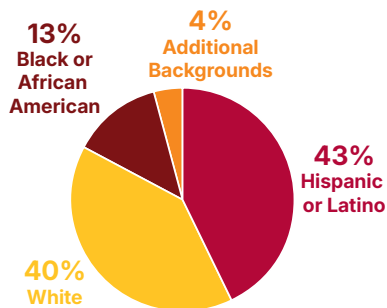

MATT BLACK '10: ASKING QUESTIONS, GIVING BACK, AND TEACHING FULL CIRCLE

For **Matt Black '10**, Scecina Memorial High School is not just where he went to school—it is where his faith, vocation, and sense of responsibility were formed, and where they continue to grow.

Now a science teacher at Scecina, Matt teaches anatomy and physiology, biology, and is launching a new botany course this year. Outside the classroom, he wears many hats, running Student Council and the Crusader Cup and advising Gaming Club, Roblox Club, Minecraft Club, and the Red and Gold Going Green Club. It's a wide scope of work, but for Matt, that breadth is part of what education demands.

“Being a teacher is a hard job—it's very demanding in ways that people don't expect,” he says. “You're answering hundreds of questions a day, often unrelated to your subject. Teachers frequently have to help students emotionally regulate and handle both good and bad news.” Beyond content, Matt sees his role as guiding students toward who they are becoming. “You have to guide them without leading them where to go, helping them become a version of themselves and not who you think they should become.”

Despite the challenges, he is clear about the reward. “You have a huge impact on every student's future, and that is a giant responsibility—but if you can handle all of that, it can be very fulfilling.”

When Matt reflects on his own time at Scecina, he does so with deep gratitude. “Scecina gave me almost everything I have in life,” he says. The school provided an education that helped him earn a full-tuition scholarship to Marian University, lifelong friendships, and even his future wife, **Katie (Hammans) Black '10**.

Two student experiences continue to influence Matt's approach to faith and learning. One involved after-school conversations with teacher **Margaret Zeh**. “I would meet with her after school with my notebook full of questions,” he recalls. “Her taking the time to take my questions seriously and not dismiss them helped me grow in my faith—even when I had doubts.” That openness left a lasting impression. “It taught me that we don't have to accept what we don't understand. We are encouraged to ask and question and seek out answers, not just blindly accept on faith.”

Another formative memory came from **Chad Tuley's** classroom, where creative projects—like a mock trial

of *Lord of the Flies*—sparked Matt's love for innovative teaching. Today, he finds himself on the other side of those moments. “Now I'm a teacher, acting in a skit or workshopping new segments on the Red and Gold Show,” he says. “Seeing the work and effort needed and the positive outcome you get from it—it just feels full circle.”

Matt also recalls a pivotal leadership lesson from his time as a student. When the student body grew upset over a school issue and prepared to protest, then-Principal **Tom Davis** chose conversation over consequences. “He brought us into his office and heard our concerns,” Matt says. “He communicated with us like we were equals, not just students.” That moment still influences him. “Students are going to be adults, and the only way to prepare them is to treat them like adults—give them opportunities to surprise you in how mature they can be.”

Giving back to Scecina feels natural for Matt. His family has been part of the community since 2002, and after graduating in 2010, he continued helping with senior retreats before joining the faculty in 2014. “It was instilled in me by my parents that if you're going to do something, then commit to it.”

For Matt, Scecina is not just part of his past. It is a living community he continues to serve—one question, one student, and one lesson at a time. ■

UNDERSTANDING THE NEW FEDERAL SCHOLARSHIP TAX CREDIT PROGRAM

A New Opportunity to Support Students and Expand Educational Access

A significant new federal program is set to take effect in 2027, creating an opportunity for individuals to support K–12 education while receiving a federal tax credit in return. Known as the Federal Scholarship Tax Credit, the program was established by Congress in 2025 and is designed to encourage charitable giving to Scholarship Granting Organizations (SGOs) that provide educational scholarships to eligible students.

For families, schools, and educational organizations, this legislation could open new pathways to educational opportunity. For donors, it creates a unique way to direct charitable support toward student scholarships while receiving a dollar-for-dollar federal tax credit of up to \$1,700 annually.

How Does the Program Work?

Beginning January 1, 2027, taxpayers in participating states may contribute to approved SGOs and receive a federal income tax credit equal to the amount donated, up to \$1,700 per year. Unlike a tax deduction, which reduces taxable income, a tax credit directly reduces a taxpayer's federal tax liability.

Scholarship Granting Organizations will then use

those contributions to provide scholarships that help students access educational opportunities and services. Here in Indiana, the SGO will be Indiana Quality Education, which is the same SGO for the Indiana Tax Credit Scholarship.

These funds may be used in connection with public, private, or religious elementary and secondary schools, depending on the scholarship program's design and eligibility requirements.

Who Can Benefit?

The program is intended to serve students from low- and middle-income households. Under the federal law, scholarship eligibility is generally limited to students whose family income falls below 300% of the area's median income.

Currently, more than half of Sccecina's students would be eligible for the scholarship.

What Does This Mean for Indiana?

Indiana has already elected to participate in the Federal Scholarship Tax Credit program, positioning organizations and schools throughout the state to benefit once the program becomes operational on January 1, 2027.

As federal regulations and implementation guidelines continue to be finalized, SGOs will work with state and federal officials to establish the framework

for accepting contributions and awarding scholarships.

Why This Matters

For generations, philanthropic support has helped make educational opportunities accessible to students regardless of financial circumstances. This new federal initiative creates an additional tool to strengthen that tradition.

For Sccecina, this means that we have a new way to fund our most important initiative, making sure that anyone can attend Sccecina regardless of financial circumstances.

Looking Ahead

While contributions eligible for the federal tax credit will not begin until 2027, schools, scholarship organizations, and supporters are already preparing for the opportunities this program may create.

As additional guidance is released by the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service, families and donors will have a clearer picture of how to participate and maximize the benefits available through this new initiative. For schools committed to making transformational educational experiences accessible to more students, the Federal Scholarship Tax Credit represents an exciting development worth watching in the months ahead. ■
